# From the Principal



Dear Parents / Guardians, Friends, Staff and Students of OLSH College,

#### The Bonsai Child

A few weeks ago, members of the OLSH College Leadership Team were able to hear from Clinical psychologist and researcher Dr Judith Locke. Dr Locke is author of the book 'The Bonsai Child' as well as her recently released book 'The Bonsai Student' and soon to be released book 'The Bonsai Teacher.'

In both Dr Locke's book and presentation, she observes the phenomenon of 'overparenting', or over-nurtured children and not equipping our children or teaching them how to cope better with life. This over-emphasis on the child's happiness, and an expectation they will excel at life, can breed anxiety and perfectionism in the child. Parenting is a fine balance between anticipating your child's concerns, challenges and letting them experience it in a way that builds resilience. In her book, Dr Locke provides clear, practical strategies which enable parents to encourage their child's resilience, confidence, and self–regulation, as well as slowly stepping back to enable their children to mature and become independent.

#### REFLECTING ON OUR COMMON HUMANITY



Have you ever stopped to wonder that countries do not exist? In nature, there are no countries, merely a land mass. Likewise, borders of countries do not exist. These are merely human constructs. This realisation makes our common humanity easier to grasp. In this way, we are more likely to see others as our brothers and sisters.

Despite this, these ideas are powerful. Very powerful. Many people have been willing to die for their 'country' in the past. Migration is always a 'hot' political topic.

The 'overview effect' is a shift in awareness reported by some astronauts during spaceflight, often while viewing the Earth from outer space. It is the experience of seeing firsthand the reality of the Earth in space, which is immediately understood to be a tiny, fragile ball of life, "hanging in the void", shielded and nourished by a paper-thin atmosphere.

From space, national boundaries vanish, the conflicts that divide people become less important, and the need to create a planetary society with the united will to protect this "pale blue dot" becomes both obvious and imperative.

Michael Collins, an astronaut on the Apollo 11 flight to the moon said the following:

'The thing that really surprised me was that it [Earth] projected an air of fragility. And why, I don't know. I don't know to this day. I had a feeling; it's tiny, it's shiny, it's beautiful, it's home, and it's fragile'.

This sort of experience can open the heart to the need for social justice.

In this spirit, I share with you a snippet of a letter written by Pope Francis to a group of migrants gathered in Lajas Blancas, Panama, where thousands of migrants are congregating, hopeful of reaching the USA

I would like to be there with you at this time. I too, am the son of migrants who set out in search of a better future. There were moments in which they found themselves with nothing, to the point of suffering from hunger, empty-handed, but with their hearts full of hope.

Migrant brothers and sisters, never forget your human dignity. Do not be afraid to look others in the eye, because you are not a throwaway; you too are part of the human family and of the family of God's children. And thank you for being gathered there

May Jesus bless you and the Holy Virgin keep you. And please, do not forget to pray for me.

After completing what could be described as the most challenging year of their high school journey our graduating class of 2023 ventured into the 'real' world, ready for every new experience that came their way. Many of our 2023 graduates have completed their first 6 weeks of university, and it is so lovely to hear their updates, experiences and the things that they miss about being at OLSHCollege.

Riza Bhayla, is one of these students. She has completed her first 6 weeks of a Bachelor Commence (Accounting) / Masters in Finance at UniSA. It has been so lovely to hear her share her experiences and the things she wishes all Year 12s and OLSHies knew. We share with you some of her key thoughts and messages.

Looking back at my Year 12 experiences, here is some key advice that wish I could have told myself.

- 1. When it comes to assignments and studying for exams, do not procrastinate or cram. It's really easy to say I'll do this later, I have so much time until the due date but it is unbelievable how quickly the time goes by. Also, it is good to start ahead of time to avoid stress but also be able to enjoy yourself, because you don't want to be finishing off an assignment when your friends are out having fun.
- 2. Something I wholeheartedly believe is that when you are doing something you love, it doesn't matter how challenging it is, you will always be motivated. When I started university I was unsure about how I would find it but it's safe to say I absolutely love what I'm learning and because of this, I find myself wanting to go in every day. Therefore I encourage Year 12s to think carefully about what you choose to do after school. I also encourage every OLSHie to really think about what subjects you enjoy, because when you love what you're learning, success is guaranteed.
- 3. Another important piece of advice is to make sure you have created a balance between school and outside life. Year 12 is a time that won't come again so make sure you enjoy it as much as you can, focus on your work as well, but a balance is necessary.
- 4. Lastly and possibly most importantly, I think something I really wish I kept in mind throughout Year 12 is not to compare your grades to others, it does more harm than good. Going into university, I quickly realised that a grade doesn't hold the significance that we give it, it's merely a sign to see how you are progressing. Always remember that just because you didn't score the best, it doesn't mean it's all over, you can always try harder next time.

#### YEAR 12 - PIT STOP





As a bit of fatigue sets in and the Year 12 students yearn for a break, we took the opportunity to take some time to reflect on Term 1 of Year 12 and the fact that Stage 2 subjects only have 6 months remaining!

After discussing the important business of meeting deadlines, being in class as often as possible and using one's own intellect to complete tasks, rather than turning to artificial intelligence, we turned our attention to maintaining a steady, consistent, and dedicated pace for the remainder of the year and looking after wellbeing just as much as academic endeavours.

Ms Rose Cecere, our Flexible Pathways Coordinator spoke about the steps that lie ahead in terms of applications for post school pathways and considering the broad range of pathways available that best align with their dreams and goals. Ms Carol Adams, Student Counsellor, provided useful tips for maintaining wellbeing, in particular good sleep, healthy eating and a balanced approach to study, work, family, and the things students enjoy.

We were privileged to welcome OLSH Alumnae, Ellise Adams (Class of 2021), Laura Wildman (Class of 2022), Riza Bhayla and Maxine Taylor (Class of 2023) who shared their learnings and experiences from Year 12, providing first-hand insight into some of the challenges of the final year of high school and how to cope with the workload, high expectations and decisions about future pathways. The questions from Year 12s were fabulous as were the insights from the OLSH Alumnae. Some key tips included:

- Start study for exams as early in the year as possible, continually revise and avoid cramming just before exams.
- Keep trying, even when you have days you feel less motivated, anything is better than nothing.
- Utilise study spaces, like University Libraries for focussed study.
- Maintain a regular and consistent study time (study from 5 8pm rather than late at night).
- Use the online support networks for Year 12 students and You Tube resources that support your study.
- No Netflix, it is a time waster.
- Use weekends wisely.
- Use disappointments as a chance to learn and improve.
- Communicate with your teachers and reach out when challenges come your way.

#### And most importantly

 It is your Year 12 do not constantly compare your results to others or be influenced by your friends when they are not in the mood to study, focus on your journey and growth.

We know the Year 12 students found great value in the session and are motivated to continue to pursue excellence for the remainder of the year. It is also a timely reminder to Year 12 families to take time to provide emotional support and encouragement to their daughters throughout the year, especially as the assessment tasks continue to build. Where possible provide time for your daughter to be freed from household duties and chores so that she can focus on her work and avoid any holidays or appointments that prevent her from attending school, where she will miss vital information and content. Most of all, support her to pace herself and celebrate the small achievements, the completion of a task, the achievement of a test, learning a new concept rather than focussing on final scores or grades that can often place additional pressure and take focus from the tasks at hand.

Having a student in Year 12 can often make the whole family feel they are living the challenges of the final year together but you are your daughter's first cheerleader and first source of comfort and support so be there for all the highs and lows with a shoulder to cry on and a smile to reassure her it will be ok and before you know it you will be celebrating her final moments as a high school student.

We remind all Stage 2 students about the holiday workshops on Monday 15 and Tuesday 16 April which are designed to give them an opportunity to review content and assessments with teachers. We also encourage them to take time for a rest over the break.

## HELPFUL INSIGHTS INTO TAXATION AND SUPERANNUATION

A key focus in the Stage 1 Workplace Practices is to prepare all girls for the world of work and develop a broad understanding of their rights and responsibilities as employees. In Week 9 we were privileged to be joined by Economics and Financial Management experts, Mr Creazzo and Mr Scacchitti to provide a deeper understanding of taxation and superannuation.

While taxation and superannuation can be extremely daunting and confusing, Mr Creazzo and Mr Scacchitti presented the essentials for students in a way that was understood and gave a great insight into the importance of taxes for the economy and also our responsibilities to ensure we are paying taxes correctly. Students also learnt about a range of tools to determine if they are paying appropriate taxes and how to lodge tax returns at the end of the financial year.

They also provided insight into superannuation, the importance of building a good nest egg for retirement and the benefits of contributing to superannuation from very early in one's working life. This was noted as being particularly important for women who may receive less superannuation in their working life due to working part-time or taking maternity leave. All students were interested to hear that by adding an additional self- contribution of 8% of superannuation when entering the workforce, which can have great benefits when reaching retirement.

We thank Mr Damain Creazzo and Mr Quin Scacchitti for providing their time and expertise and know all students were given a lot of useful information to consider as they prepare for employment in the future, with some even checking their current pay slips!
